The 2023 Sally Fox Award has been awarded to King Street Center and the Afterschool Excellence & Summer Camp Support program. The award is in honor of Sally Fox, who worked as an attorney and director of the Vermont Disabilities Law Project of Vermont Legal Aid before being elected in 1986 to the Vermont House of Representatives from the town of Essex. At King Street Center, children practice building their social-emotional skills, try new physical activities, and strengthen their academic skills daily. This is accomplished through strong staff, tutors, & community partners as well as close ties and communication with parents and the school district. In addition to this intensive academic support, every day at King Street Center includes warm meals, tinkering, art, cooking, and loads of fun gym games – all of which contribute to the overall success of a child.

VTCF Awards \$50,000 Grant to the Arts Bus

For the first time in our organization's history, we have awarded a \$50,000 grant to fund an impactful project serving kids across Vermont. The Arts Bus has been rolling across Vermont bringing art supplies and art education to children living in our most rural areas for over a decade. The 1994 International Diesel is iconic and creates a rolling makerspace everywhere it goes. However, with summer tires, no heat (or A/C), and limited interior light without connecting to an electrical source, the bus is not an all-weather vehicle. At 28' long and nearly 10' tall, it requires a special driving talent and can only be driven 5-6 months of the year on paved and moderate grade roads. The Arts Bus needs a new way to reach our children, all year round. VCTF is proud to provide the funding needed to buy a new vehicle. Genny Albert, Executive Director of the Arts Bus is grateful. team of peers is fun, says Tasneem, and the teachers are extremely supportive. "They help you whenever they can tell that you're scared or not sure what to do," she says. They make learning even basic skills such as knot-tying fun. She especially liked the exercise of practicing tying a sailing knot behind your back (try it- it's not easy). Most important, they're right there whenever you need them.

But make no mistake - sailing safely is serious business, and the sailors are taught how to handle both the practicalities and the unexpected. The hardest skill she's had to learn so far, says Tasneem, is how to sail a boat without a rudder. "You have to figure out how to use the jib, sail and main sail to steer. It can be really frustrating and confusing." But, as with all of her training, the counselors are right there to lend a hand as needed.

And the best part? Going fast. "You don't need a strong wind," she says. "I just love it."

While she's not ready to say she wants to make sailing her life's career, Tasneem hopes to be a junior instructor when she turns 16. And her mother approves. As the youngest of five and the only girl among her siblings, "she's always been responsible," says Mona. "But she's become even more so, with added confidence, because of her experiences at the Lake Champlain Community Sailing Center."

And most important, she's having fun.
